Chiyo-Jo Haiku Museum 千代女の里俳句館

Nakagawa Kazumasa Memorial Museum of Art 松任中川一政記念美術館





This art museum is the personal museum of Kazumasa Nakagawa (1893-1991), a modern master of western painting in Japan and a recipient of the Order of Culture. His various types of dynamic artwork are on display here, including painting, calligraphy, and pottery. This museum was opened in Matto, the home town of his mother, with personal



Models and other materials reproducing scenes of swordsmithing by the living national treasure Sumitani Masamine are on display here. Other items on display include the achievements of Akegarasu Haya and Matsumoto Hakka, a reconstruction of the administrative buildings for Todai-ji Temple's Yokoe-no-sho estate

Display related to shishimai lion dance (the ruins of which have been designated as a national historical relic site), and folk materials including traditional farming implements.

Cultural Properties and Historic Sites

Matto Furusato-kan, Siun-en Garden 松任ふるさと館、紫雲園









The former residence of Yoshida Mohei, a businessman who was active before World War II, is now open to the public as a cultural facility. The gorgeous architecture indicates the prosperity of the Yoshida family in those days. The main house and the gate have been designated by the national government as registered tangible cultural properties. The adjoining Japanese garden, Siun-en, provides visitors with a place to rest and unwind, with its seasonal beauty and elegance.

Matto Joshi Park

This park is named for Matto Castle, which is said to have originally served as the residence of Plan for the Old Castle of Matto the Matto Family. In 1583, the castle became the residence of Maeda Toshinaga, and went through a number of changes before it was abandoned in the early 17th century. A stone monument in the castle's main enclosure site in

the park and five stone monuments showing the boundaries of the castle site in the urban area have since been erected, based on an old drawing made during the Edo period (1603-1868).

Honsei-ji Temple

Honsei-ji Temple is an old temple of the Otani school of the Shinshu sect. The front gate was originally constructed in 1801

as the gate for the residence of the Cho family, one of the Kaga Domain's chief retainer families. Around 1881, Matsumoto Hakka, the chief priest of Honsei-ji Temple, took over this gate and relocated it to its current location. Hakka excelled at classical Chinese literature and waka poetry, and his calligraphy is also highly regarded.

6 Shoko-ji Temple _{聖典寺}

Shoko-ii Temple has ties to the poet Kaga no Chivo-jo. The Monument to Chivo-ni, located within the precincts, is a stone tablet inscribed with a haiku composed as her final words. It was erected in 1799, on the 25th anniversary of her death, in memory of her illustrious achievements. The front face of this 1.3-meter-tall natural stone tablet is inscribed, "Final Words: Viewing the moon/I now bid farewell/to this world - Monument to Chiyo-ni."

Rinsen Shooku 旧加賀藩本陣青木家臨川書屋

Rinsen Shooku was a lodging facility (honjin, or officially appointed inn) for use by the lord of the Kaga Domain and others. The name — literally, "riverside writings-shop" — comes from the fact that this inn was built next to the Nakamura Yosui canal.

The Aoki family (Kasama-ya) served as leading town officials for generations. After the discontinuation of the otaya that had been the domain's honjin in the Naka-machi district, Rinsen Shooku functioned as the honjin for the Matto area from 1741 through the late 19th century.
